Unfortunately, just finding such people is not enough; they must be willing and able to serve. The newly elected trustees will play a significant part in helping to keep VSR on the straight and narrow for the next three years. Look at an agenda for a Trustee Board meeting and you will see the kinds of tasks and decisions they are required to handle on a continuing basis. Remember, the Board runs the show and has the fiduciary responsibility for doing so.

This year two Board of Trustee positions for three-year terms are open, those currently held by Tom Barry and Ron Caterino. Neither Tom nor Ron intend to run for re-election this year.

Barbara Leary has again agreed to serve as our Election Commission Chair. Nominations should go to her (at 978-692-8631 or barbara.a.leary@comcast.net) or to Great North on or before August 16th. Those who have accepted their nominations will have an opportunity to "present" themselves to us on Candidate's Night on September 2.

Ballots will be mailed to residents and these must be cast before or at VSR's Annual Meeting to be held on September 29. We shall be given the election results by October 6.

CRAFTY LADIES

What started out in 2004 as a very small group of knitters (three) has now grown to seventeen+. We were a small group that met in the evening. For awhile we tried meeting in the afternoon, then back to the evening hoping for a larger turnout. In 2007 we did a Daduza (comfort) dolls project for the AIDS orphans in Africa. Our group made close to 23 dolls. Thenceforth we decided to stay with Monday afternoon meetings.

Why did we start out as a knitting group? Knitters across the world say that knitting is simply the best therapy. It is thought that stress can cause or exacerbate up to 90% of medical conditions. It is already known and accepted within the medical profession that occupied people feel less pain and depression, so that seemed to be a good starting point. The rhythmic repetitive movements of knitting are thought to induce a form of meditation. It is a state of mind when you are not mulling over the past or fretting about the future.

We have evolved into a needlecraft group as some have decided to bring out their other needlework UFO's (unfinished objects), and word has spread that we are not just knitters. We have grown to seventeen+ crafty ladies. Some of us knit, while others crochet, needlepoint, cross stitch, quilt and embroider. Joyce Minosh came in one day knitting socks. Next thing several people wanted to learn and now we might even have knitted enough socks for the entire VSR community. Socks are being knitted by both new and veteran knitters. New methods are tried: four or five needles or just one long needle. Carole Shyavitz brought in a sweater that she had finished, and now several women are making the sweater for themselves. New ground is being broken by many.

We welcome all needle art enthusiast. We offer support for any new project, and remember that supportive friends help us to live longer, healthier, happier lives. We meet on Monday afternoons from 1-3 and welcome drop-ins.

When Carlene was asked about the beautiful quilt we see pictured here, she said "It is a crib quilt that I started in May and have worked pretty obsessively on it. I am having a new grandchild (the MT contingent) in late August, and we don't know the gender so I wanted it to be suitable for either. It was meant to be a sampler that would encourage the maker to use a variety of sewing machine techniques, and that really appealed to me. I learned to do pin tucks, chenille, bobbin work, circular sewing among other things. Some of it was quilted before appliques were put on. The bear and lamb are fleece.

I used nearly all scraps from my "stash" and only had to buy the backing and some of the border colors. I am working on the quilting now and hope to have it done by early August to send it out to Montana. It was the most fun I have ever had doing a quilt."






AN EVENING WITH MARK POULIN AS ROY ORBISON

Skip and Pauline have done it again. They are bringing entertainment to our clubhouse – a talented musican named Mark Poulin who will perform a tribute to the late Roy Orbison. In comparison with the Rod Stewart show, this will be more low-key with Mark singing many of Orbison's dark, emotional ballads such as *Crying* and *Only the Lonely*, but he'll also do some of the more upbeat like *Pretty Woman* and *You Got It*. Orbison's music dates back to late 50's and early 60's. He is considered one of the all-time most popular and iconic American rock & roll artists. Mark has been performing his Roy Orbison tribute for over 15 years. His renditions of Roy visually and vocally are eerily accurate.

Mark is an excellent musician in his own right. He splits his time between performing and songwriting. He plays drums, guitar, bass and keyboard as well as doing all the vocals, and his songs have been recorded by many well-known artists. You may also expect him to sing *Running Scared*, *Pretty Paper*, *It's Over*, and *Dream Baby* among others.

been exposed to or would not have chosen on our own.


