Babette's Feast

Mort and I recently watched this film again. An oldie but goodie, we enjoyed it even more this time around. A Danish film based on an Isak Denison's story, it tells the tale of two spinster sisters in the 1800's who have been kept from "straying" by their strict father, a pastor in a bleak town on the coast of Denmark. The sisters are beautiful and pursued by many suitors, but their father makes sure that they do not succumb to anyone's advances, including those of a famous opera singer and a handsome cavalry soldier.

Years later, after the death of their father, the sisters are doing good deeds for their community when Babette, an escapee from the Paris Commune of 1871 and a friend of the opera singer, arrives at the sisters' door, asking them for refuge. She becomes their housekeeper in return for lodging. When Babette wins the lottery, she uses the money to prepare a magnificent meal to celebrate the hundredth birthday of the sisters' late father. One of the guests, the cavalry soldier of their youth, now a decorated general, comments that he has not tasted such delicacies since dining at a famous Parisian restaurant. It turns out that Babette had been the chef at that restaurant, and this is her way of repaying the sisters for rescuing her.

The dishes served would make any gourmand salivate. But even more important is the generous and loving environment Babette creates. Petty disagreements of the guests disappear and the ascetic community savors the sumptuous experience.

Beautifully filmed and acted, this is a feast for the eyes as well as the palate. See it!

LIBRARY NEWS

If you want to watch an interesting five minute video watch "Librarians Set Book Domino World Record." To kick off their summer reading program, The Seattle Public Library broke the world record for the longest book domino chain on May 31st at the Central Library. Over 2000 books were used and a portion of the books formed the word **READ**. It took twenty-seven volunteers seven hours of set up and five tries. A total of 2013 books followed a complex pathway that included ramps up and across book stacks, around a large planter in the center of the floor, up and down sets of stairs, bridges, and more. At one point, one book had to fall from a shelf to the floor to continue the book

domino chain.

Researchers at Rush University Medical Center in Chicago gave nearly three hundred participants in their 80's a memory test each year for six years. The participants also answered a questionnaire about whether they regularly read books, wrote letters, and visited the library during childhood, adulthood and at

their current age. Those who reported reading and writing throughout their life, especially in old age, were 32% less likely to show deterioration in brain regions involved in memory compared with those who said they did not regularly engage in those activities.

Once again I must ask those of you who like to read without the book jackets on your books to **PLEASE** put them back on before you return them to your VSR library! **Books without jackets are immediately removed** and cannot be used by others. No one wants to take out a book that has no description of what it is about. Thank you for thinking of other people!!

Why Don't We Install Individual Water Meters at VSR?

Several people have asked the Water and Sewer committee about the possibility of purchasing and installing individual water meters in each of the 110 units. This approach would allow our water and sewer

fee to be proportioned according to water usage rather than a flat fee equally divided among all 110 users as is now done.

The Water and Sewer committee understands that individual water meters would provide a more equitable distribution of expenses; however, such an approach would require overcoming the following obstacles:

- VSR has a contractual agreement with the Tyngsboro Water District
 (TWD) where TWD agrees to supply water to VSR and to provide a single
 invoice to VSR for this water at their going rates every month based on a
 single monthly meter reading. TWD has not and will not agree to reading
 and invoicing 110 meters.
- 2. VSR would need to hire a third party to read 110 meters on a monthly basis.
- 3. VSR or its management company would need to compute 110 individual water and sewer bills each month based on the 110 meter readings and the single TWD monthly charge.
- 4. Our management company would need to provide 110 individual invoices each month. These amounts would change every month.
- 5. My estimated cost to buy and install a single residential water meter is about \$200. Each unit owner would be billed this one-time fee. Additional meter maintenance costs would also be borne by the individual unit owner.
- 6. With individual meters and bills on average half of the unit owners (those with "light" water usage) would see their water and sewer bills decrease while the other half (those with "heavy" water usage) would see their water and sewer bills increase relative to the present equal-payment system. It is unlikely that the unit owners that would see an increase in their bills would want to pay the increased costs associated with individual water meters. This increase cost would be the one-time \$200 cost plus the cost of reading the 110 meters every month plus the cost of computing and invoicing the individual water and sewer bills every month.
