


# **MEMORIAL DAY, 2014**

Doc Adams couldn't get her up for it. However,


Marshall Giles rode out on his horse and rounded up **The American Country Music Band** and they went and gave us an evenin' of good ole fashioned barn dancin'.

However, we are able to become better acquainted with one another during our "refreshment time" and especially through the thoughtful interactions during the discussion of the chosen book. Our next meeting will be Thursday, June 26. At that time we will be discussing a book by one of our favorite authors, Barbara Kingsolver. *Flight* 

Behavior is set in rural Appalachia.

Dellarobia Turnbow – on the run from her stifling life – charges up the mountain above her husband's family farm and stumbles onto a "valley of fire" filled with millions of monarch butterflies. The town's parishioners, then the international media, deem this vision miraculous. But when Ovid, a scientist who studies monarch



behavior, sets up a lab on the Turnbow farm, he learns that the butterflies' presence signals systemic disorder – and Dellarobia's in-laws' logging plans won't help. Kingsolver gives equal weight to climate science and human need, to forces both biological and biblical. Her concept of family encompasses all living beings and *Flight Behavior* gracefully, urgently contributes to the dialogue of survival on this swiftly tilting planet." --*Mari Malcolm* 

At our August 7 meeting the featured book is *Orphan Train* by Christine Baker Kline. "On the coast of Maine lives a wealthy ninety-one year old woman named Vivian Daly. From Vivian's early childhood in Ireland, to New York City, comes her passage on the Orphan Trains in 1929. A journey that will take her to Minnesota, from one home to another, never really knowing what home feels like, as she is treated like a slave and seldom has enough of anything, much less affection or love.

Now in the year 2011, a seventeen-year-old girl named Molly Ayer meets the elderly woman. Told in beautifully evocative prose, the story unfolds in alternate perspectives, revealing what has happened to each of them, and how the parallel lines of their lives now converge to spotlight the similarities between them. The novel demonstrates how wonderfully unexpected moments can happen in a life, even in one that is full of turbulence, pain, and loss." *Laurel-Rain Snow*

He confronts legal building code battles in the same dignified, stubborn manner with which he has lived his life.

The couple is still very much in love, and while the countryside in New Brunswick is stunning, the relationship between the two of them is even more beautiful. Whether they relate to each other with gentleness, sensuality, humor, or frustration, you know that they are truly committed to each other until death do them part. This is a superbly-acted, unforgettably moving, love story.

## **Tree Study Committee Formed**

The Tree Study Sub-Committee has been formed to evaluate tree care within the Village and to recommend to the Board of Trustees a plan for removal, replacement, and short and long-term management. The Committee consists of **Judy Premru, Frank Bashore, Bill Townsend, Paul Currier** and **Larry Tobiason.** This Committee was not formed as a regulatory group but as an information gathering Committee to help us preserve existing ornamental trees, forest trees, tree screens, open vistas, and identify hazardous tree locations.

A series of walks by the Committee and a professional tree care advisor helped determine priorities such as: work that could be done by volunteers during Work/Play Day and other such events over time, and a contract-out component consisting of tree removal, tree relocation, and replacement in some cases of those that exhibit declining health. Priorities were set and budgets prepared for the next three years that will help set in motion ongoing care and maintenance programs. Results gathered each year of the preceding year's activities will be used to guide future maintenance objectives.

The aim of the Tree Study Committee is to help balance volunteer abilities, contract services, and budgeted money available. It is the Committee's plan to present these findings during a Board of Trustee Village walk-around the first week of June followed by a presentation at the June Board meeting.

# **Trustee Policy: Tree & Shrub Removal**

This policy shall apply to trees in all areas of the Village. Trees shall be removed from the Village only with approval of the Property Committee. Requests for removal shall be submitted in writing to the Property Committee stating the reason for removal. Where appropriate, the Property Committee shall seek comments from abutters before making its decision. The Property Committee shall notify the Board of its decisions.



Requests for removal of healthy trees for convenience may be granted on a caseby-case basis, but the removal costs will be the responsibility of the requesting unit owner. Unit owners have the right to appeal any decision to the Board of Trustees. The Trails Sub-committee may approve removal of trees along wooded trails. Requests for removal of shrubs shall be submitted to the Landscape Committee for review and approval in accordance with established Board policy for the planting of shrubs.

The Board of Trustees requests that this policy be observed without exception.

#### Andersen Wooden Window Grills- Love'm or Hate'm

It's springtime and window washing season is here! Have you tried to remove your wooden Andersen window grills? Did you break them? Well, you are not alone. There is an installation procedure to be found on the Andersen web site, as well as ordering instructions for new grills.

The secret is to open the metal grill fastener at the end of each frame, then align the grid and press firmly over the fastener. DO NOT LIFT THEM FROM THE CENTER OF THE GRID.

To remove the grill, use a cake knife (or flat putty knife) and place the blade under the grill at the intersection of where the grill inserts into the sash. Twist the knife and the grill frame will pop out. Do not force it or you could break the window. To reinstall, make sure you have cocked the fastener out, and press firmly on the grill at the fastener point.

To order new grills you will need to know the model number of your window. Ours is # 3056. The model number of your window is stamped on the bottom of the screen. You will need to take the screen off to find it. We (all VSR) have Andersen Model 200 Series Tilt Sash manufactured around April, 2001. The grill replacement cost is about \$25 per grill. #### 2014 IRRIGATION SPRINKLER REPAIR PROCEDURES

The three wells that furnish water to the Village sprinkler system were activated for the season on May 7<sup>th</sup>, and routine operations have begun. Again this year, the sprinklers for each zone will continue to be on longer and will run every other day. According to the experts, this is better for the turf. The Irrigation Sub-Committee has established some procedures to deal with the damage and failures that occur within a system of this size and complexity.

Residents should report all problems with the irrigation system to Sarah Carr at Evergreen Management, Inc. The preferred method of reporting problems is by email at <a href="mailto:scarr@evergreenmgt.com">scarr@evergreenmgt.com</a>. You can also report by telephone to (800) 973-4300 or (603) 622-7000. If you call after normal working hours please do not request that the answering service page a repairman unless there is an emergency such as a broken sprinkler pipe that is gushing or a major leak. Evergreen will refer all sprinkler problems to the Irrigation Sub-Committee who will evaluate the situation, correct it if they can, refer it to Morin's Landscaping for repair, or place it on a repair backlog list for future correction as funds become available. Items given to Morin's for repair will normally be corrected during Morin's weekly maintenance visit. Evergreen will provide feedback to the resident as to the corrective action taken. Please help us to maintain this complex system by adhering to the above procedures.

## **Planting Policy**

Planting of annuals, bulbs, and perennials appropriate to the setting in established beds does not require prior approval. The Unit Owner is responsible for maintaining these plantings, e.g. watering, weeding and fall clean up. Installation of additional bush/shrubs and landscaping is subject to the approval of the Landscape Committee and shall be at the Unit Owner's expense and subject to standards as to location, use and maintenance established by the Board from time to time. No bush/shrub removal is allowed without the Landscape Committee's approval.
