

# A Message from Our Board of Trustees

As summer flies by, it is time to plan for our upcoming VSR Annual Meeting to be held this year on Wednesday, September 28, 2016 at 7:00 p.m. at the VSR clubhouse. The Annual Meeting this year includes elections for two positions on the Board of Trustees, as follows:

- A three (3) year term currently held by Peter Abate
- A three (3) year term currently held by Lawrence Tobiason

Both of these terms will become new three (3) year terms. We invited all unit owners of the Village to consider becoming a candidate for this position. Nominations were accepted between July 15 and August 15, 2016.

The names of candidates accepting nomination appear in this Newsletter. Candidates accepting nomination supplied a brief statement for publication in the Quarry Bulletin. In addition, a Candidates' Question and Answer forum is planned as part of our regular Village Meeting scheduled for Thursday, September 8, 2016.

Ballots will be mailed to every unit owner of record on or before August 31, 2016, and will list the candidates for these positions. The ballot (one per unit) will request voting for two candidates for the three (3) year terms on or before the September 28, 2016 Annual Meeting. All ballots will be collected in a sealed voting box, located in the Clubhouse Entry, which will be delivered to Evergreen Management Inc. for tallying following the Annual Meeting. Extra time is needed since the vote cast by each unit is required to be weighted by the percent interest in VSR of that unit. The candidates receiving the highest number of weighted votes will fill the designated positions. The results will be announced by October 5, 2016 and the newly elected Board will meet on October 17, 2016.

Thank you for the nomination to the Board of Trustees. As many of you know, I served on the Board previously from 2007 to 2011. I found it a very interesting and rewarding experience. As Quarry Bulletin editor for the past five years I worked with Board and committee members to keep the community informed, and I observed the workings of the Village from an overview vantage point. I saw many positive developments. Although it seemed that I was always soliciting volunteers in the pages of the *Bulletin*, we have had quite a few new residents step into important positions as Property co-chair, Bulletin editor, and website manager, and there are new members of many committees.

We have undertaken some large projects and done so in a fiscally sound way due to our policy of maintaining adequate reserves. We have seen several noncommittee members take on one-time jobs to augment our "full-time" volunteers as cookout organizer, election officer, and event sponsor. New ideas have sprung up such as Happy Hours and new resident orientation packets, and we continue to support traditional events like Work/Play day as well.

There are challenges ahead as we enter our  $15^{th}$  year. As we have more and more new residents we need to welcome

them into the life of the Village and encourage them to take on leadership positions on committees and on the Board. We need to continue long range planning to manage the large projects that will come up as our infrastructure ages. We need to work closely with EMI to maximize our return on our management expenditure and to evaluate realistically what we can accomplish with volunteers and what we need to entrust to EMI. The Board should take the lead in these decisions, making wise policy that will carry us forward in a fiscally responsible way that we are comfortable with. We should continue with our philosophy of a "Village" in meeting the needs of residents as we age, but look for the balance needed in an "active adult" community.

I think I can contribute to the Board as we face these challenges. I have lived in Westford for forty-five years and the Village for fourteen. I was a Board member for four years and President for a year. I have a working knowledge of the "systems" of the Village: waste water treatment plant, irrigation, landscape contract, property management, and the *Bulletin*. I am committed to maintaining good communication within the Village. I have great respect for the work that each Board and committee member does and look forward to working closely with them as a Board member, developing and implementing policies, looking at the Village as a whole, helping maintain the Village we love and continually improving it.



#### **DECK PROJECT UPDATE**

We are pleased to report our deck project has reached past the half way mark with the completion of cluster 5. Cluster 6 has begun on lower Stone Ridge at Lorraine and Phil MacPherson's. Phil recently joined the deck project as co-project manager to help out Buzz McArdle. The project is currently on budget and is scheduled to be completed by October. Cluster 7 which is the beginning of Stone Ridge #4, should start about September 1. The crews have done a fantastic job, working in 95-degree heat. So, if they are working on your deck, a glass of ice water or lemonade might just make their day.

Gas Grill Warning: Recently, it was noticed that an iron gas line that goes to a gas grill was seriously corroded and required replacing. Should it have ruptured, an explosion might have occurred. If you have a gas grill that is fed by natural gas from the house in a black iron pipe, please inspect it for any corrosion. The deck crews have been asked to keep a look out when they open the decks, but this does not negate the homeowner's responsibility. Many times it just needs to be sanded and painted, but in some cases it might require replacement by a plumber. Please contact the property committee chairman Nick Johnson if you are concerned. The Board is inquiring about having all the natural gas lines checked by the town, or a certified gas licensed plumber. If you buy gas by the tank (LPG) disregard this notice. -Buzz




## BOOK CLUB NEWS


the world how to fly - Wilbur and Orville Wright" (Amazon review)


For newcomers to the Village, please know that all are welcome and encouraged to attend our meetings. We begin with refreshments at 1:00, followed by the discussion at 1:30
