




Quarry Bulletín September - October 2016

GAS GRILL WARNING

Recently, it was noticed that an iron gas line that goes to a gas grill was seriously corroded and required replacing. Should it have ruptured, an explosion might have occurred. If you have a gas grill that is fed by natural gas from the house in a black iron pipe, please inspect it for any corrosion. The deck crews have been asked to keep a look out when they open the decks, but this does not negate the homeowner's responsibility. Many times it just needs to be sanded and painted, but in some cases it might require replacement by a plumber. Please contact the property committee chairman, Nick Johnson, if you are concerned. The Board is inquiring about having all the natural gas lines checked by the town or a certified gas licensed plumber. If you buy gas by the tank (LPG) disregard this notice. –Buzz

CARING FOR YOUR NEW DECK

Here are a few important tips for taking care of your new Duralife deck:

- 1. Water will bead on the deck surface after rain storm. This is a normal with composite decks. Eventually as the rain, snow, sun work on the surface, this will stop. You can speed up the process by washing the deck with a soft bristle brush, soap, and water. Do not clean the deck with any solvents, never ever.
- 2. Clean up spills right away. If left over a period of time, they may stain.
- 3. Do not put any rubber or plastic flat items on the deck, especially not rubber door mats or rugs. We suggest a natural cocoa shell mat.
- 4. Please use a plastic-blade snow shovel. Metal shovels will damage the deck.
- 5. Use a calcium chloride snow melt for composite decks, not rock salt.
- 6. Please take caution and use the proper foot wear. The deck may be slippery when wet!




BOOK CLUB NEWS



Clubhouse Rentals by Sandy Kelly

One of our Village's most beautiful assets is the Clubhouse. This impressive structure greets residents and guests each time we drive up the hill. The Landscape Committee adds seasonal flowers, the Social Committee changes decorations and maintains supplies and the Keurig for all to use. A Refurbishing Committee has assessed upcoming needs to keep the interior up to date and refreshed.

The building is used for meetings, exercise classes, happy hours, book discussion group, knitting group, bridge, Friday night poker and games, brunches, dinners, cookouts, musical events and a place to watch the Pats game when the rest of the Village has no power! It is the place that brings us together as the warm and caring neighborhood that we are.

Residents can also plan their own VSR social event at no cost. These events are those which are open to all residents, like our impromptu Labor Day gathering, the Sunday afternoon gathering Songs by Wendy, and all of the great musical events that Skip Giles orchestrates. Social Committee will add it to the VSR calendar once it is approved by the committee and will even assist with the planning.

The clubhouse can also be rented, by residents only, for family gatherings, groups and other social events. This requires a call to Linda Cyr at EMI. The fee is \$100 plus a \$200 deposit, which is returned after inspection that the facility was left as found. You will also be required to submit a Waiver of Liability form. Once the reservation is completed EMI will add it to the VSR calendar.
