#### **CLUBHOUSE REFURBISHING COMMITTEE UPDATE**

January 2017 will bring new furnishings to our clubhouse. Existing furnishings were showing wear, were too heavy and bulky to move easily, and were not comfortable for our residents to sit on and rise from. The Clubhouse Refurbishing Committee completed a plan to refurbish the Great Room and Library of the VSR Clubhouse. In November, VSR Trustees approved the purchase of new furnishings with funds accrued over the years in a Clubhouse Capital Reserve account.

With the assistance of an interior designer at no cost, the Committee developed a design to refurbish the Great Room. Referencing some furniture pieces identified by the earlier Refurbishing Committee, members received estimates from two vendors for these pieces as well as alternate pieces. Flooring choices for both rooms were reviewed and estimates sought for carpet installation with felt padding.

Both the Library and the Great Room will be carpeted. All of the Great Room furniture, with the exception of the piano, will be removed. Two sofas and three groupings of upholstered accent chairs will be placed in the Great Room. This room will be more light and welcoming to both residents and visitors, providing comfortable seating for both small and larger groups. The fireplace will remain the focal point of the room.

The uncomfortable leather furniture in the Library will be replaced with a sofa and two wingback chairs from the Great Room. Seating in the Library will be more comfortable than it is now.

Clubhouse and Fitness Center activities will be curtailed during the delivery and installation period, estimated to be at the end of January or early February. As much notice as is possible will be given to all groups who use these areas. We ask that you be tolerant of the 5-6 days of confusion at 2 Stone Ridge Road.

Both rooms must be emptied before the carpeting can be installed. We will ask for volunteers to help move the to-be-kept pieces to other temporary locations in the clubhouse. Unneeded furniture pieces will be first offered to VSR residents, with the remainder donated to Household Goods in Acton for their disbursement to eligible families. On January 18, from 1:00 to 3:00, residents may come to the clubhouse to select the pieces you would like to 'adopt'. All pieces selected must be removed by Jan. 28.




#### A WORD OF THANKS




## **Book Club News**







Our next meeting on January 5th will feature a local author, Alan Emmet, who wrote *Our Side of the River: a Memoir.* This book relates "her

### **Deck Tips**

Snow will soon be here. If you shovel your deck, do not use a metal blade shovel, it will damage the surface. Use a plastic bladed snow shovel.

Use a calcium chloride snow melt for composite decks, not rock salt.

The deck may be slippery when wet. Please use the proper foot wear.

# **Planning for the Unexpected**

In November, a number of Villagers greeted Mike Votano, a hospital emergency room nurse who visited VSR with information about the new Westford Emergency Services Registry. We are fortunate here to also have a Helping Hands Committee, which will provide a ride to an appointment, a dinner or to pick up supplies and even just some company when needed. However, while we all live independently and feel confident a neighbor would come to help us in a time of difficulty, resident Wendy Wolfberg summed it up nicely when she said, "We all need to be a bit more humble about what our future needs may be."



Most of us think we know what we would do in an emergency but we never really make a fully thought out plan. If you live alone, or your relatives are at a distance, or you just like the peace of knowing someone could check in on you during a serious storm or natural disaster, please consider filling in the Registry form. You can access a copy from the link below or call the Health Department and ask for assistance to get one. Our Health Director Sandy Collins will be retiring in January but Mike has also volunteered to make an appointment and come work with you to gather the necessary information. The registry could help in an evacuation with medical equipment, to provide emergency shelter information or even what to do if you have a pet in an emergency.

Also available are these magnetic pouches, which can be kept on your refrigerator! As an emergency room nurse Mike said these are very helpful if you need to be brought into the hospital via ambulance. The fire department workers who automatically accompany an ambulance will look for this File of Life on your refrigerator. They give it to the EMTs who hand it to the emergency room nurse at the hospital. This provides the ER with immediate information about your medications, vital current info about pre-existing conditions without having to access computer records. It can save

important time in determining how to properly respond to your health issue. You just fill it in, make changes when needed to keep it current and place it on your refrigerator.
