They are informed and engaged, working in active partnership with our management company, Evergreen Harvard Group (EHG). There are five Trustees, each serving a 3 year term at staggered intervals. Each summer we ask for nominations from residents to fill the upcoming vacancies. My role is to coordinate the nomination process. I hope you'll continue reading and consider running, either this year or in the future.

This year nominations will be open from July 5 - August 5. Later this month you'll receive a letter about the details, and I'm happy to answer questions if you contact me. There will be two positions to fill, as Buzz McArdle and Tom Sangiolo complete their current terms of office. Nominees who accept are asked to write summaries of their experience and interests, for the August Quarry Bulletin, and to participate in Candidates Night, on September 5. Elections will be held as part of the Annual Meeting on September 12, and new Trustees will join the Board in October.

What is involved in being a Trustee? The most visible part of the job is the monthly open meeting, when the Board conducts business and reviews the work of each standing committee. In addition, each Trustee serves as the liaison to one or more committees, attends those committee meetings, and reports back a summary of activity and issues at the monthly Board meetings. It's helpful for a resident to have served on a committee prior to becoming a candidate, though not required. The Board also works on contracts, special projects, and other occasional issues that may arise in the Village. Those who have served over the years report many rewards. It is an opportunity to better know our neighbors, and to utilize skills and knowledge accumulated over past years for the benefit of our mutual community.



- The Women in the Castle by Jessica Shattuck


We sincerely hope that you will enjoy reading some of these books in Friederike's memory!



2018 Lawn Mowing and Fertilizing Schedules

Lawn Mowing: (May 1st – October 31st) Lawn mowing will be performed pending weather conditions weekly on Thursdays. Heavy rains may delay mowing into the following week. During drought periods mowing may be delayed up to a week to prevent lawn damage. Weekly mowing will also include trimming of edges and removal of excessive grass clippings.

Walkways and hard surfaces will be blown free of debris.

Lawn Fertilizing: Morins provides five lawn treatments annually using the "ECO SMART" Lawn Care Program. ECO SMART provides Balanced Slow Release Fertilizer, Pre-emergent Crabgrass Control, Grub Control, Broadleaf Control, Surface Insect Control and Nutsedge Control at their appropriate application times. During the 3rd Application lime is also applied over 1/3 of the village on a 3-year rotating schedule. As a reminder after each application, small yellow fertilizer warning flags will be set in the grass on each side of the clubhouse main entrance doors indicating the application has been completed.

Lawn Fertilizing Schedule

- 1st Application Completed (May 4th and 5th)
- 2nd Application (June 4th 19th)
- 3rd Application (August 6th 18th)
- 4th Application (Sept 24th Oct 12th)
- 5th Application (Nov 5th 16th)
