Locally...

Beginning on March 19th **MarketBasket and Whole Foods** will have early shopping hours for seniors over age 60.

- On Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays <u>MarketBasket</u> will open from 5:30 7:00
 AM. MarketBasket also offers a shopping service from <u>InstaCart</u> and they will make your specific purchases and deliver them right to your door. They are offering free delivery the first time.
- Whole Foods has also started opening with early shopping hours for seniors one hour earlier than the regular opening. We can now enter at 8 AM rather than the usual 9 AM. If you have Amazon Prime you can also place your order online and have it delivered free of charge. While they usually offer two-hour delivery, they are now backed up and may take as long as several days to deliver.
- Westford's Annual Town Meeting has been postponed until May 2nd. Elections might also be rescheduled but need state approval first.
- The town Select Board has now banned groups larger than 10 people.



River Birch Program: In February we successfully removed the 26 River Birch Tree Clusters from around our units. Next on our agenda, we will be grinding, and removing the waste of all the stumps that will not be replaced with new trees. Those stumps will be ground later when the new trees are planted. We are planning to replace at our cost all those trees that were located in front of units. We are also planning to replace those trees which were on the sides of the units at the unit owner's expense. I have already been contacted by a couple of owners who will be replacing trees on the sides. We have a list of approved replacement trees with pictures for both the front and side of units. Any unit owners who have had one of these River Birches removed from the side of their unit and would like a replacement at their cost, please make yourself known.

Work - Play Day: Originally planned on May 2nd, Kentucky Derby Day, both events are now cancelled.

Property Committee Needs Support: Of late, 70% of our committee, after years working for us have decided to rest their weary bodies. You have seen them over the years organizing, painting, and fixing our stuff on their own time. This has helped to keep our property up to par and our fees (less) high. We would like you to join us at our regular monthly meeting. We can put your skills to use. We are in dire need of a cochair to help to coordinate jobs and vendors on various repair needs to your homes. We need a person to coordinate work with our landscape company. We also need a few folks to help with minor repairs, brush and small tree removal. We have started this year with a skeleton crew. If things cannot be done by us, like we have done in previous years, we will need to outsource more of it with our management company Evergreen Management Group, impacting our fees.

Roof Washing We will be continuing our roof washing program this year in April. We plan to do all the units on Rockwell, Gatecrest and 29 Sandstone week one or two. Notices will go out to the effected homes soon, if not already started.

TRIPLE CROWN ESTATES, PHASE II

Many VSR residents have been hearing the pounding of rock-crushing equipment coming from behind the homes on Sandstone Rd during the early winter. Construction has begun on the access road and the eight homes being built adjacent to VSR. We have recently been made aware that there is now in the planning a second phase of that development that will add another seven homes adjacent to the eight Triple Crown Estates initial development.

As some of you may know, our builder, Guthall, LLC, purchased a plot of land in Tyngsborough adjacent to our northwest side and then deeded a 100 ft strip of that land to VSR to provide more land behind some of the homes along Sandstone Rd. The remaining area of that Guthall plot has now come under agreement with the developer of Triple Crown Estates to allow another group of homes to be built to the north of us in what has been a wooded natural hill with several hiking trails. Several of our residents recently attended a Tyngsborough Planning Board meeting where the same Triple Crown developer presented their latest plans for the new development, to be known as Belmont Estates. The plans now call for a dead-end road to connect with the planned road being constructed for Triple Crown Estates and providing access for seven residential homes along that road.

As we witnessed in the meeting, there are a number of difficulties that must be sorted out before this new plan can be approved by the Tyngsborough Planning Board and implemented.



The accompanying figure shows the Triple Crown Estates plot plan and a rough sketch of the planned plot for the Belmont Estates. Much must be resolved before this new development can be approved. In addition, some of the residents of Daisy Lane, in the housing area to the north of us, have hired a lawyer to represent them in hopes of fighting against this plan. I will be monitoring the progress of this plan as it goes through the initial phase of approvals and will try to keep VSR apprised of its status.






- Click on what you want to read. Your log in is your library card number. Your PIN number is the last 4 digits of your phone number unless you have changed it to a personal password.

Want free videos and documentaries instead? Go back to ECOLLECTIONS and click on **Kanopy**. Same process to log in.

Maybe it's time to do that genealogy research you haven't had time to start. One of the research databases that you can access from home with your library card is called **Heritage Quest**.

Don't have a library card? Email me and I will arrange to get you one! Though the library is closed until further notice, as an employee I will be able to help.

The library's book drops and interlibrary loan services are now locked or unavailable. If you have library books just hold on to them. Westford does not charge fines and all libraries in the Merrimack Valley Library System are closed.
