Future Condo Budget Challenges ~ A Message from the Board of Trustees and the Finance Committee

Every year the Village has financial issues facing it. However, we believe that the Village will be facing more than the usual financial challenges in the coming years. We are a twenty-plus year-old complex looking at new roofs, road resurfacing, porches and deck repairs, and other items that will need repair or replacement at some point in the future. The question is not if but when. The Village annually funds a Capital Reserve account by depositing monies into savings accounts (mostly Certificates of Deposit at local banks). These Capital Reserve funds are meant to cover the cost of capital asset replacements such as roofs, roads, decks, and other assets, when needed.

The Village conducts a Reserve Analysis Study (RAS) every five years to update the remaining useful lives of our assets as well as the estimated costs to replace them. The 2020 reserve study estimated roof replacements starting in 2032 and finishing in 2035. These dates are now in serious doubt. The Village was scheduled to have a RAS done in 2025, but we have recently moved the study to April 2024 because members of the Property and Finance Committees are concerned about the condition of VSR's aging roofs. We replaced four roofs several years ago, a roof in 2023, and have already signed contracts to replace four roofs in 2024. We expect the 2024 Reserve Study will give us a guideline on the timing and estimated costs of roof replacements going forward.

A second major concern is the cost of resurfacing of our roads which is currently planned for 2027. The 2024 Reserve Study will also give us a guideline on the road repairs. This projected cost may be increased from the 2020 estimated cost due to inflation's effect on the costs of contract labor and the petroleum products used in asphalt.

The upcoming Reserve Study report will also project when other capital assets such as driveways, siding, etc. need to be replaced and at what projected cost. Looking several years ahead, an additional concern is the future cost of landscape maintenance, irrigation, and snow removal. These contracts will end in the fall of 2025. We are fortunate that several years ago volunteers negotiated a 5-year fixed-fee contract. We hope to have something similar going forward, but we must expect cost increases. These two contracts are almost one third of our operating budget.


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Insurance costs have also gone up dramatically in the past two years, and we have no reason to expect these increases will not continue.

The Village also has a fund for Water & Sewer expenses. Each year we establish a W&S fee based on these costs. This fund has two major expenses: the purchase of our water from Tyngsboro and the operation and maintenance of the wastewater treatment plant and its related facilities (at the clubhouse). The age of the equipment (for example, some of our grinder pumps are twenty-two years old) and inflation could result in higher W & S fees going forward.

Our Water & Sewer operations are governed by rules and regulations established by the Massachusetts DEP. Beginning later this year, we will have an outside engineering firm prepare the renewal license paperwork for our 2025 renewal. Based on the information we provide and inflation over the last five years, the DEP could require us to increase our replacement reserve. We are now fully funded with funds held in escrow through August 2026. If we must increase this DEP reserve in the future, it will come from interest earned on the fund's CDs and higher Water and Sewer fees.

As you can see, there are major financial challenges ahead. You can be assured that the Committees concerned with managing these are thinking about them and planning for how to meet these challenges. One way to keep costs down is to maintain our cadre of volunteers, and you will hear more about that in a few days in a letter and checklist from the Trustees. We will be keeping unit owners well informed over the coming months and welcome unit owner input on any of these topics.



Interested in Hanging a Flag on your home? ~submitted by Paul Currier

At the June 2023 Board of Trustees meeting a proposal was made requesting the Trustees to modify the regulations for displaying the American flag. The proposal was to allow unit owners the option to display the American flag on their units. The Trustees asked the Architectural Committee to draft a set of specifications/rules regulations for displaying the US flag on



units in the village. The ASR committee invited unit owners with an interest in helping draft the regulations to volunteer for the assignment. Paul Currier, Eli Demetri, and Ken Hyles volunteered.

The Flag proposal committee met through the summer/fall and presented a final flag display specification proposal to the Trustees in December 2023. The Trustees voted to accept the flag specification proposal at the January 2024 trustee meeting. The ASR committee established two overarching guides. Flag displays must be identical so that VSR's uniformity of appearance is maintained. The flag displayed must be a current US flag.

The committee felt strongly the display of the American flag on our homes would embrace the ongoing goal of the village to beautify the community while maintaining continuity throughout.

Below are regulation highlights.

- \square US flags only will be displayed on homeowner's units.
- \Box Displaying the flag is voluntary.
- \square Flags should be made in America.
- \Box Flags may be displayed 365 days of the year or at the homeowner's discretion.

□ Flags are flown from dawn to dusk. However, if a unit owner wishes to display the flag dusk to dawn the flag must be illuminated. Front porch lights are acceptable for illumination.

 \Box Flags will be displayed at the front step landing/entry to the unit.

- \Box There are specifications for each model unit in the regulations.
- \square ASR must approve any exceptions to the regulations prior to installation.
- \Box The dimensions of the flag to be displayed are 3 ft X 5ft.
- \Box The unit owner is responsible for cost of material & amp; labor to install the flag.

 \square Unit owners are responsible for any damage caused to the unit as a result of the installation.

□ Homeowners must complete the flag display request form found in ASR documents. Request forms must be approved by ASR prior to installation.


Catching the Eclipse On April 8th... ~ submitted by Larry Leif

These are 3 of the 90 photos Larry Leif took in southern Maine during the 2.5 hour solar eclipse. The first photo was taken approximately 23 minutes after the moon began covering the sun. The second photo shows the maximum coverage of the sun, about 96%, at about 3:32 pm. The 3rd image was taken at 4:16 pm. One can see several sunspots, the so-called small darker spots on the sun, which are slightly cooler than the rest of the surface (3,500 degrees vs 5,800). It's an amazing coincidence that the sun which is over 400 times the diameter of the moon appears to be exactly the same size in the sky. If that were not the case, one would not see the beautiful corona of the sun

Recycle your Eclipse Sunglasses...

You can drop off the glasses until April 19 at the Town Manager's office at 55 Main Street. They will be donated to Astronomy Without Borders and be redistributed to Northern Africa and Middle East countries for 2027. Town Hall is open Mon-Fri, 8am-4pm.

Recycling in Westford...

Our recycling vendor is currently Waste Management. Recycling and trash must be at the curb no later than 7:00 am. NO Plastic Bags or packaging.

EMPTY, CLEAN & DRY: Empty all liquids, clean out any food residue, and ensure the material is dry before placing in curbside recycling bins. Bottles, cans, plastics, paper, and cardboard can be mixed together.

Cardboard must be flattened and cut into sizes no greater than 3 x 3-foot sections. bound with string or tape, or stacked inside another cardboard box not exceeding 3 x 3 ft.

Also, a Household Hazardous Waste **Collection** will be held on May 4th, 9 am – 1 pm at Westford Highway Garage, 28 North Street. Proof of Residency is required. Fees Apply (Checks Preferred).

For those looking to explore other Asian Cuisine restaurants in the area, try the Purple Bamboo.

Jayne & travel Rte. 3A quite often and we pass the Purple Bamboo **Method** in North Billerica. Every time, we've noted the parking lot is often full. So, one night we decided to stop for a bite to eat.

The bar and lounge area are lively. There is a lot of socializing, playing Keno and watching sports on TVs above the bar. Off the bar and lounge area there is a separate dining area for those looking for a quieter experience. The dining area has booths for seating. The lounge area has high top tables and the bar for seating. We headed for the bar and luckily found two seats.

We ordered drinks immediately, while looking over the menu. The menu is huge! Appetizers of course with house specials, and beef & pork, chicken, seafood, Thai cuisine, Cantonese hot pot, Moo Shi plus they serve combo plates all day. Also, I must add the drink menu is extensive with many of the typical tropical drinks, popular martini's, beer, and wine. I had a Mai tai. Jayne had a Pina Colada. Special note: the drinks have a generous pour.

After socializing with our neighbors at the bar and enjoying our drinks, we ordered. My neighbor told me the Crab Rangoon is great as is the Mongolian beef. Jayne loves Crab Rangoon and ordered it as an appetizer with chicken Lo Mein as a main dish. I opted for a combo plate. I wanted to try a little of everything. I decided to go with a plate of chicken wings, beef teriyaki skewer(s), Crab Rangoon and pork fried rice. The plate was massive with (3) Crab Rangoon & chicken wings, (2) beef teriyaki skewers with the fried rice. We both thought the food was great.







